- 5. I, congratulate the principal and the editorial board for a well compiled Annual Magazine. I wish the school an exceedingly bright future.





History of Sainik School Mainpuri

It was the year 2019, when 30th Sainik School in the chain of 33 Sainik Schools sprawling across the length and breadth of the country was raised. This emerging incipient school was a sequel to the concerted endeavour of the legendary cultural ambassador and the then Union Defence Minister, Late V K Krishna Menon .The onus of translating vision from the drawing boards into reality fell on the first Principal, Lt Col Agnivesh Pandey. Thus, was born Sainik School Mainpuri. Located near Agra-Mainpuri highway in the district of Mainpuri, it is around 100 Km away from the Seven Wonders of the World the Taj Mahal which provides an ideal backdrop for the school.

Sainik Schools were established by the MoD under the aegis of the School Society, to rectify the regional and class imbalance amongst the Officer cadre of the Indian Armed Forces, by preparing students for entry into the National Defence Academy (NDA), Khadakwasla, Pune, Maharashtra. Today, there are 33 such schools covering almost all the states of the country.

An MOA was signed on 30th April 2015 between

NAMES OF THE HOUSES

The Vedas (Sanskrit वेद véda, "knowledge") are a large body of texts originating in Ancient India. Composed in Vedic Sanskrit, the texts constitute the oldest layer of Sanskrit literature and the oldest scriptures of Hinduism.

Veda is the highest authority in Hindu knowledge system and the authority of all other scriptures are based on the authority of the Veda.

Vedic truths transmit goodness everywhere. The Vedas aim to uplift everyone spiritually and materially. There is no place for sectarianism in the Vedas. They contain principles that promote peace and contentment throughout the world. The message of the rishis is encapsulated by the mantra:

'लोकः समस्ताः सुखिनो भवन्तु' –

'May all beings everywhere be happy'. The Vedas are not blindly accepted just because they are hailed as अपौरुषेय. On the contrary, it is because they uphold universal values such as truth, righteousness, austerity, compassion, love, sacrifice and non-violence that Hindus regard the Vedas as being of utmost sanctity and as the most authoritative scripture.



There are four Vedas: the first, the Rigveda, was composed before 1200 BC, followed by Samaveda and the Yajurveda and finally the Atharvaveda. Each Veda is composed of two parts: the Samhita, in which the hymns or mantras are recited, and the Brahmanas which contain commentaries.

The Rigveda. The Rigveda ("Wisdom of the Verses") contains 1,028 hymns dedicated to thirty-three different Gods, but mostly to Lord Indra, Agni and Soma. The 10,589 verses of Rigveda are divided into 10 mandalas or books. Its priest is called the Hotri, who officiated at sacrifices and recited the mantras of the Rigveda.

The Samaveda. The Samaveda ("Wisdom of the Chants") is better known for the intricacy and metre of its poetry. The Samaveda is a collection of chants or Samans, drawn mainly from the eighth and ninth books of Rig-Veda, for the Udgatri priests who officiated at the soma sacrifice. The Samaveda is a collection of songs than of mantras.

The Yajurveda. Yajurs are sacred formulas, invocations and spells muttered by the adhvaryu priests who performed sacrificial rites, so the Yajurveda is called the "wisdom of the sacrifices". This work contains specific sacrificial formulas which were recited during that form of ceremony.

The Atharvaveda. The Atharvaveda ("Wisdom of the Priests") is attributed to a sage, or rishi, named Atharvan, and consists of a number of hymns and magical incantations. Some scholars believe that this scripture may have originated with the original pre-Aryan culture of indigenous peoples, and because it deviated from the other Vedas, it was not at first readily accepted. Eventually it too was adopted as a ritual handbook by the Brahmans, the highest class of priests.

Drawing inspiration from these four Vedas, the houses of Sainik School Mainpuri have been named as Rigveda, Samaveda, Yajurveda, and Atharvaveda House and the objective behind it is to make the cadets physically fit, mentally robust and spiritually enlightened.





WHO AM I?

As a young child, you would perhaps never be haunted by the above question. One is so engrossed growing up and exploring the world that seldom would anyone stop to do a self-appraisal. Now the question popped on top is not the usual philosophical or existentialist conundrum, although ultimately it is all connected. So the little reader may for a while yet, withhold the logical urge to turn this page in a hurry. This piece is about the manner in which we perceive ourselves, which is an exercise most of us indulge in, just short of a job interview or an SSB in the context of Sainik Schools. It's at that instant we recognize there are chinks in our personality which don't auger too well for selection into the elite academy, we have been dreaming about (whether there has been commensurate effort is a different matter).

The discovery of one's true identity is an event better late than never to happen. Hence forward, the cadets need to guard themselves against putting on a charade, even as they "prepare a face to meet the faces that (they) meet" (TS Eliot).

But is it easy to hide the hideous? (maybe that is a strong word- sorry, couldn't resist the alliteration; "imperfections" perhaps is more suited). Like roots penetrating a derelict structure, there are traits and qualities of our persona which have over the formative years fossilized into our physiology. A few of these elements are not exactly what one would be particularly proud of hearing about in say, a family tale, and yet these are not easy to shrug off in the restricted time at our disposal. Therefore there is a tendency or a feeble attempt towards concealing our real self by faking virtues which are yet alien and masking vices which are wrapped around like second skin.

SSB, we are told, does not test our knowledge. There are experts who analyse our behavioural traits, especially in problem situations. Unlike the Big Boss House, there is only so much that the participants are able to disguise and not for too long (perhaps only in the initial exchange of pleasantries).

Then the demeanour slips. There is a lot happening which one has to cope with that it's not easy keeping up the act. Truth, alas, will be out.

There is no denying that the preparation for SSB begins the day one joins Sainik School as a Class VI Cadet. This is the whole point of enrolling into a residential system like Sainik Schools. The next seven years is the phase in which firstly the child who has likely arrived with a baggage of undesirable attributes such as laziness, rudeness, deceit, conceit etc needs to promptly discard them because these at best can only provide short term gains such as a safe exit or a cover over our limitations etc. We also need to be fortunate to have a well wisher (of a 'no-mincer-of-words' kind), who is not afraid of exposing our blind spot (remember the top right pane of Johari window- faults which we are oblivious to but which are obvious to others). If you thought unlearning negative lessons is tough (old habits die hard), walking the thorny path indicated by your conscience is going to be many times more complicated. Hard work, Honesty, Kindness, Composure etc are not only difficult acts to dig, but completely killing to keep up with. To be on the track of truth, it's not just the extra time and toil which are required,

it also demands great sacrifice because you, with your passion to plough a lonely furrow are likely to fall out of favour with your closest allies and associates. But gradually with passing years, not only will the things we practice, become our second nature, prodigal friends too will realize their folly and return to your fold.

The West Point Cadet Prayer has this moving line, "Make us to choose the harder right instead of the easier wrong and never to be content with a half truth when the whole truth can be won". This is the high calling and price which leaders are willing to pay in pursuit of excellence. On the other hand, if the obsession with our image is not matched by an equally strong intent and willingness to surrender a life of ease, we would fall prey to the all too tempting shortcuts in life, which in the long run instead of protecting our aura would only taint our standing by exposing our weaknesses. The face ceases to fascinate, the moment it turns into a façade (oh no! don't I need to work on my weakness too, for the repetitive syllable!).

THE ESSENTIALS OF A SOLDIER

1. Field- Marshal Viscount Wavell once said that the first quality of the Generals is robustness. Similarly for the private soldier toughness and endurance, is the prime requirement. "Valour and sufferance," said a fine commander Monk, when he was asked to define the first essentials of a soldier. Some of the essential qualities of a soldier are defined as under.

Toughness

- 2. The difference between the old type of soldier and the modern type is that the old soldier was tough. The modern type has usually to be toughened. When the Spartans were at the height of their military fame and glory, they sent a deputation to the oracle at Delphi and demanded arrogantly, "Can anything harm Spartans?" The answer came, "Yes luxury."
- 3. The modern civilized man has a definite handicap to overcome as a soldier in his subservience to easy way life. It is interesting to note how standards change and how the toughness of the ancients seems always greater than that of the present generation.

CONT....

Inherited Qualities

4. The quality of toughness is inherited and partly produced by training; and that inheritance is more important. Not all the modern easy ways of life have been able to eradicate the hard-core of native toughness in the British race; though we did little enough to train it or keep it alive in the years between the wars. The modern British soldier, once trained is capable of feats of endurance as great as any of the past; as the Long Range Patrols of the Western Desert, Wingate's raiders in Burma, the men of Arnhem, and many others have shown. The American soldier of this war is a great fighting man-tough, daring and resourceful. His reputation will stand second to none.

More Adaptable

5. Skill at arms is the next essential after endurance; the soldier must know how to use his weapon or weapons effectively – a comparatively simple matter in the old days, a very complicated one now, when nearly every man must be a specialist. The modern soldier is certainly more skilled than the old type would have been. It is of interest to note, how the stress laid on different types of weapons varies with different armies. Speaking very generally, the pride of the British Army has been in the controlled accuracy of its small-arms fire.

CONT....

It is illustrated by the rapidity of rifle fire which allowed a handful of infantrymen to hold the front at the first battle of Ypres and to beat back the mass assaults of Germans, who reported that they had been opposed by the fire of numerous machine guns. Nowadays the anti-tank gun must almost be accounted for a "small arm"; our men have shown the same coolness and marksmanship in handling it.

Boot and Spade

6. The French since Napoleonic days have relied much on their artillery fire their infantry has trusted to vigour of assault rather than to musketry. The Spanish pike men were famous in the days when Spaniards held a large share of the world. Suvorov, a great "soldier's General," taught the Russians to rely mainly on the push of bayonet, and closer-quarter fighting —expensive, but effective when the manpower reservoir is almost inexhaustible. The strength of the German has lain more in method than in individual skill, in painstaking staff work, preparation and training. There are two universal and most important weapons of the soldier which are often overlooked-the boot and the spade. Speed and length of marching have won many victories, the spade has saved many defeats and gained time for victory. Even these days of mechanisation they are still essential.

CONT....

They are neither of them popular weapons with the British soldier. To say that a good soldier must have discipline is no more than to say he must have learnt his trade well.

Drill has a Reason

The military manifestations of discipline are many and various. At one end of the scale may be placed the outward display, such as saluting and smartness of drill, the meaning and value of which are often misunderstood and misused both inside the Army and outside. Saluting should be in spirit the recognition of a comrade in arms, the respect of a junior for a senior-a gesture of brotherhood on both sides. Good drills should be either a ceremony for the uplifting of the spirit, or a time-saver for some necessary purpose-never mere formalism, or pedantry. No one who has participated in it or seen it well done should doubt the inspiration of ceremonial drill. No one has understood the effect of mass display better than our arch-enemy, Hitler. But pomp and ceremony should be for special occasions, not for every day. In the old days, it was not merely the foundation but almost the whole edifice of regular warfare

CONT....

It was a close-order drill that made formidable the Greek phalanx, the Roman legion, the Spanish array of pike men; the famous "oblique order" of Frederick the Great depended on it; enabled the British line to defeat the French infantry column and the British square to hold off the French cavalry in the Napoleonic wars. Today it is still essential for any purpose, and an effective artillery barrage could not be laid down if the movements of the gunners in loading and firing had not been practised by constant and enact drill; a bridge could not be built rapidly under fire unless all staged had been worked out and rehearsed to a high degree of certainty; unless airmen conformed to a regular drill in starting and landing their aeroplanes there would be many casualties. These are examples of the outward, the mechanical side of discipline, learning by practice to do something so automatically that it becomes natural even in moments of stress. It is essential both to warfare and to orderly efficient civil life.

Peace and War

8. If anyone doubts this, let him consider the discipline he employs daily in his rising up and in his lying down-of the time for instance that it would take him to knot his tie if he came to it unpractised. Of the inner spiritual side of discipline, something will he say in the second part of this essay.

CONT....

One great difficulty of training the individual soldier in peace is to instil discipline and yet to preserve the initiative and independence needed in war. The best soldier in peace (officer or man) is not necessarily the best soldier in war-though he is so more often than not and it is not always easy in peace conditions to recognise the man who will make good in war. The soldier who is a thorough nuisance in barracks is occasionally a treasure in the field.

Taking a Risk

9. The best soldier has in him, I think a seasoning of devilry. Some years ago a friend of mine in a discussion of training defined the ideal infantryman as "athlete marksman, stalker." I retorted that a better ideal would be "cat-burglar, gunman, and poacher." My point was that the athlete, marksman, or stalker, whatever his skill, risks nothing; the cat-burglar, gun, and poacher risk life, liberty, and limb as the soldier has to do in war. A good soldier will soon learn the 'tricks of the trade'—some useful, such as the proper care of his feet on the march, of his weapons and equipment at all times, the secret of making the best of uncomfortable conditions; some bad, such as scrounging of looting.

CONT....

To sum up, it seems to me that the essential qualities of the individual good soldier are endurance, skill at arms, and the valour of discipline with some pungency of independence.

Soldier As A Comrade

10. Whatever good and well-trained a man may be as an individual, he is not a good soldier till he has become absorbed into the corporate life of his unit and has been entirely imbued with its traditions. The spirit of the soldier is his ultimate factor of success in war.

Meaning of Morale

11. That spirit, which we call morale, is a collective rather than an individual quality. What makes that spirit, and how far we can cultivate it, is a subject on which many volumes have been written. Much is said nowadays of the necessity that the soldier should be convinced of the justice of his cause, and he certainly cannot escape propaganda. Yet many battles and campaigns have been won by men who had little idea of why they were fighting, and perhaps cared less. It is, I think, arguable that soldiers often fight well because they have a good leader than because they have a good cause

CONT....

I am sure that they fight best of all when they are part of a good unit, and feel it. Nobody of men should in theory have had a more inspiring cause than the Crusaders, yet the Crusaders were by no means always successful, nor did they always fight well.

Men of Minden

12. Did the men who fought at Minden, and performed one of the most surprising feats of disciplined valour in the history of war, know exactly why they were fighting? If so, they knew something that has puzzled many students of history. Did Cromwell's Ironsides win victories because "they knew what they were fighting for and loved what they knew, "or because they were better drilled, better disciplined, and had a more trustworthy leader than their opponents?

Whatever may inspire morale, it is an essential element of any military force. It is the inward spiritual side of discipline. It can be seen in such incidents as the sinking of the BIRKENHEAD, when the soldiers on board stood in order on the deck, while the women and children were put in the few boats available, and the ship sank under them. This has been regarded as a perfect manifestation of discipline since the King of Prussia ordered an account of it to be read at the head of every unit in his army.

CONT....

Regimental System

13. Regimental system is the backbone of the Army and how I qualify my statement is that take a complete living unit, and train for the special work required, with the elimination, of necessity, of the weaker men, would produce better results. This is, I know controversial, but I believe that all regimental officers will support this contention. If we wish to maintain the true spirit of the soldier, we must continue to build on the old traditions and the old loyalties. I have read much military history. There rise is my mind the images of some of those conflict-Xenophon's Ten Thousand, the Roman Legionaries who conquered the world of their day, the Mongol raiders of Genghis Khan or Tamer lane, Napoleon's "Old Moustaches, "the Russian soldiers of Suvorov's astonishing Swiss campaign, the men of Gettysburg or the Wilderness before Richmond, the valiant warriors of our country, the grim but formidable Boches.

The soldier has, a quality of tolerance that extends even to the mistakes of his superiors.

Epilogue

Follow the war, tell him it is a school

14. A very large proportion of those citizens who have served in this war have reached a standard of physical fitness they have not known before and could not easily have acquired in civil life. But it is the inward qualities that count. It seems to me that the best qualities of the great soldier spring from the sense of true comradeship, which is the supreme gift of military life. Self-sacrifice, loyalty to a cause and friends, staunchness and endurance in hardship and danger; are fostered by military training and comradeship. They will be required in the hard testing days of peace as well as in war. I trust that after the war the good soldier and the good citizen will be one.

हिन्दी

हिन्दी विश्व की एक प्रमुख भाषा है एवं भारत की राजभाषा है। केन्द्रीय स्तर पर भारत में दूसरी आधिकारिक भाषा अंग्रेजी है। यह हिंदुस्तानी भाषा की एक मानकीकृत रूप है जिसमें संस्कृत के तत्सम तथा तद्भव शब्दों का प्रयोग अधिक है और अरबी-फ़ारसी शब्द कम हैं। हिंदी संवैधानिक रूप से भारत की राजभाषा और भारत की सबसे अधिक बोली और समझी जाने वाली भाषा है। हालांकि, हिन्दी भारत की राष्ट्रभाषा नहीं है, क्योंकि भारत के संविधान में किसी भी भाषा को ऐसा दर्जा नहीं दिया गया था। चीनी के बाद यह विश्व में सबसे अधिक बोली जाने वाली भाषा भी है। विश्व आर्थिक मंच की गणना के अनुसार यह विश्व की दस शक्तिशाली भाषाओं में से एक है।

हिन्दी और इसकी बोलियाँ सम्पूर्ण भारत के विविध राज्यों में बोली जाती हैं। भारत और अन्य देशों में भी लोग हिंदी बोलते, पढ़ते और लिखते हैं।

लिपि:- हिन्दी को देवनागरी लिपि में लिखा जाता है। इसे देवनागरी नाम से भी पुकारा जाता है। देवनागरी में 11 स्वर और 33 व्यंजन हैं और अनुस्वार, अनुनासिक एवं विसर्ग होता है तथा इसे बायें से दाईं ओर लिखा जाता है।

इतिहास क्रम :- हिन्दी भाषा का इतिहास लगभग एक हजार वर्ष पुराना माना गया है। हिन्दी भाषा व साहित्य के जानकार अपभ्रंश की अंतिम अवस्था 'अवहट्ठ' से हिन्दी का उद्भव स्वीकार करते हैं।

राष्ट्र भाषा:- यद्यपि राष्ट्रभाषा के विषय में भारतीय संविधान में कुछ भी नहीं कहा गया है किन्तु राष्ट्रपिता महात्मा गांधी ने हिन्दी को राष्ट्रभाषा कहा था। उन्होंने 29 मीर्च 1918 को इंदौर में आठवें हिन्दी साहित्य सम्मेलन की अध्यक्षता की थी। उस समय उन्होंने अपने सार्वजनिक उद्बोधन में पहली बार आह्वान किया था कि हिन्दी को ही भारत की राष्ट्रभाषा का दर्जा मिलना चाहिये। उन्होंने यह भी कहा था कि राष्ट्रभाषा के बिना राष्ट्र गूँगा है।

हिंदी और कंप्यूटर:- हिन्दी की इंटरनेट पर अच्छी उपस्थिति है।
गूगल जैसे सर्च इंजन हिन्दी को प्राथमिक भारतीय भाषा के रूप में
पहचानते हैं। कम्प्यूटर के विकास के आरम्भिक काल में अंग्रेजी को
छोड़कर विश्व की अन्य भाषाओं के कम्प्यूटर पर प्रयोग की दिशा में
बहुत कम ध्यान दिया गया जिससे कारण सामान्य लोगों में यह गलत
धारणा फैल गयी कि कम्प्यूटर अंग्रेजी के सिवा किसी दूसरी भाषा
(लिपि) में काम ही नहीं कर सकता। किन्तु यूनिकोड (Unicode) के
पदार्पण के बाद स्थिति बहुत तेजी से बदल गयी।

हिंदी का वैश्विक प्रसार:- सन् 1998 के पूर्व, मातृभाषियों की संख्या की दृष्टि से विश्व में सर्वाधिक बोली जाने वाली भाषाओं के जो आँकड़े मिलते थे, उनमें हिन्दी को तीसरा स्थान दिया जाता था। सन् 1997 में 'सैन्सस ऑफ़ इंडिया' का भारतीय भाषाओं के विश्लेषण का ग्रन्थ प्रकाशित होने तथा संसार की भाषाओं की रिपोर्ट तैयार करने के लिए यूनेस्को द्वारा सन् 1998 में भेजी गई यूनेस्को प्रश्नावली के आधार पर उन्हें भारत सरकार के केन्द्रीय हिन्दी संस्थान के तत्कालीन निदेशक प्रोफेसर महावीर सरन जैन द्वारा भेजी गई विस्तृत रिपोर्ट के बाद अब विश्व स्तर पर यह स्वीकृत है कि मातृभाषियों की संख्या की दृष्टि से संसार की भाषाओं में चीनी भाषा के बाद हिन्दी का दूसरा स्थान है।
